## Long-Time Teacher Left For New Home

Miss Lora Lane who has the record of serving longer in Medora schools than any other teacher, left Friday for East St. Louis where she plans to reside with her sister, Mrs. T. J. Mannle. Prior to her departure Miss Lane sold her residence property and disposed of her household goods in Medora.

Miss Lane started her teaching career in the Medora schools in 1901 under the late W. J. Chapman, and continued in her profession until 1932.
